CONDITIONALS

TYPES OF CONDITIONALS

ZERO:

If clause: If , present tense main clause: present tense

e.g. If the weather <u>is</u> cold, the fruit <u>takes</u> longer to ripen

It shows something that is always true

1st type

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If clause: If + present tense

Main clause:

I future simple

Imperative

Modal + bare infinitive
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☐ Had better +bare infinitive

It shows something that is possible now or in the future

Examples

- 1. If I have time, I'll visit you
- 2. If you don't feel well, stay in
- 3. If you want, you can stay here
- 4. If it's late, we had better go

2nd Type If clause: If + simple past or past continuous Main clause: would/could/might +bare infinitive It shows:

a)something that is not true or real, or something unlikely to happen in the future b)it is used to give advice

Examples
If I had time, I would visit you
If I were you, I would study
harder

Notes:

1. In the if-clause, we usually use were instead of was after I/he/she/it 2. The if-clause can come after the main clause, but then there is no comma.

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3rd Type
If clause: If + past
perfect
main clause: would + have
+ past participle
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It shows something imaginary or untrue in the past, but that may have been possible but didn't happen

Examples

If he had been driving more carefully, he wouldn't have crashed the car

Unless=if not Ted can help you unless he is busy

Instead of If we can use:

Even if

Even if it rains, we 'll have a good time

Only if

Only if it is sunny will we go out (inversion)

As long as

As long as you promise to be on time, you will have an appointment

Providing that/provided that

Providing/provided that we were the same size, you can were my ski boots

Supposing

Supposing you could travel to any country in the world, where would you go?

On condition that

You can use my computer on condition that you don't go online

Other unreal situations would rather/sooner

- Would rather/sooner
 +bare infinitive to talk
 about the present or
 near future (only if the
 subject of the infinitive
 is the same as the
 subject of would rather)
- Would rather/sooner +
 perfect infinitive to
 talk about the past
 (only if the subject of
 the infinitive is the
 same as the subject of
 would rather)

e.g. I'd rather wait for you outside

e.g. I'd rather have taken a taxi, but Paul wanted to walk

Would rather/sooner with a different subject

Would rather/sooner +

Past simple to talk about
the present or near future

Would rather/sooner + Past Perfect to talk about the past

e.g. I'd rather you didn't speak so loud

 e.g. I'd rather they had told me about it first

It's time

It's time +Past Simple suggests that the actual time has passed

e.g. It's time we told him the truth

e.g. it's about high time they learnt to swim

BUT

If it's still the appropriate time, then we can use other structures

e.g. It's time (for us) to go

MORE TO COME... ON WISHES AND REGRETS!

Wishes and Regrets

We express our wishes and regrets in 3 ways

A.To talk about a present situation or something arranged for the future we use:

- a)Wish/If only + Past simple/Past continuous
- e.g.I wish Mary spoke Italian! Or
- I wish he were coming with us!

b)wish/if only + could + bare infinitive

e.g. I wish/If only I could swim!

Or
I wish/If only I could fly to Spain this year!

B. To talk about wishes and regrets that refer to the past we use:

I wish/If only + Past Perfect

eg. I wish/If only I had saved more money! (but I didn't)

C. Wishes for impossible or unlikely future changes (often a wish for a change in someone's behaviour) I wish/If only + subject + would + bare infinitive

e.g. I wish/If only Diana would help me with homework!

D. Wishes about future events that are quite likely hope + Present simple or Future simple

e.g. I hope Mary comes/will come to the cinema with us tonight!

Let's hope you know all there is to it about WISHES!!!
