




YOUR MISSION: MASTER THE ARGUMENT

In committee, you will not be a student. You will be a combatant in a war of ideas.

The most fundamental conflict you will face is the clash between universal human rights and cultural sovereignty.

This briefing is your playbook. It will arm you to defend either side with precision and power.



CONTENDER 1: THE UNIVERSALIST SHIELD

Human rights are inherent to all people, everywhere. Culture is never an excuse for abuse.



CONTENDER 2: THE RELATIVIST STAND

Morality is shaped by culture. “Universal rights” are often just Western values in disguise.



THE UNIVERSALIST CREED: ONE TRUTH FOR ALL

Source of Rights: Inherent to being human. They are not granted by states; they are **“INALIENABLE.”**

The Foundational Text: The Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) of 1948 is the “bible” of this perspective.

The Core Argument: Pain is the same in every language. Therefore, protection from it must be universal.



THE RELATIVIST CRITIQUE: MANY TRUTHS, MANY CULTURES



- **The Core Critique:** “Universal Rights” are a form of neo-colonialism—Western values imposed on the world.
- **The Defense of Sovereignty:** A nation’s traditions, religious laws, or social values should take precedence over foreign norms.
- **The Core Argument:** Community, stability, and social harmony can be more important than individualistic Western liberties.

ROUND 1: THE OPENING SALVOS

THE SHIELD OF THE VICTIM


This argument focuses on the individual. A person being tortured or silenced does not care about “cultural context”—they care about safety. Universalism is their only defense.

THE WALL OF SOVEREIGNTY

This argument focuses on the state. Enforcing universal norms is foreign interference. A country has the right to govern based on its own traditions, religion, and values.

UNIVERSALISM'S POWER PLAY: THE SLIPPERY SLOPE


If you accept that culture can justify rights violations, you destroy the very idea of human rights.



This is how you counter the culture argument. You accuse your opponent of opening the door for any dictator to label oppression, torture, or discrimination as “just our culture.”

RELATIVISM'S POWER PLAY: THE GHOST OF COLONIALISM

The UDHR was drafted in 1948 by Western powers when much of the world was still colonized. It reflects their values, not the world's.



Individualism vs. Communalism: Pits Western focus on the individual against African and Asian focus on family/society.

The “Asian Values” Debate: Argues for prioritizing social harmony and order over “chaotic” Western freedoms.

CLASH 1: GENDER vs. TRADITION

Absolute gender equality clashes with religious or traditional laws defining distinct gender roles.



Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)

This is violence. It is a fundamental violation of a woman's bodily integrity and human rights. There is no cultural justification.



Male Guardianship Systems

Is this a violation of freedom, or a religious adherence to family protection? Western intervention to dismantle our traditions is an attack on our culture.

CLASH 2: IDENTITY vs. 'TRADITIONAL VALUES'

Western nations increasingly view LGBTQ+ rights as non-negotiable human rights, while many other nations view them as contrary to religious or "natural" law.



Tying development aid to improvements in LGBTQ+ rights.

Human rights are universal. We have a moral obligation to use our influence to protect vulnerable minorities everywhere.



Cultural Imperialism.

You are using economic blackmail to force your social values upon us. This is an attack on our sovereignty and our right to self-determination.

CLASH 3: SPEECH vs. THE SACRED

Western universalism champions free speech, even if offensive. Many societies prioritize protecting religious sanctity and social harmony.

Example: The *Charlie Hebdo* Cartoons



The right to question, to satirize, and even to offend is essential to a free society. Blasphemy is not a crime.



This is not free speech; it is hate speech. Mocking what is sacred to millions deliberately incites hatred and disrupts social order. It must be restricted.
