2. Figurative Language & Imagery

"I have hated the words and I have loved them." — *Liesel Meminger*

"A smile that is starving": A metaphor suggesting that happiness is a rare resource for Liesel; her smiles are malnourished by the trauma of her upbringing.

"Chlorinated eyes": Imagery used to describe a cold, chemical shade of blue or green, suggesting a sterile or harsh gaze.

"Wardrobe build": A physical description of Rosa Hubermann, implying she is sturdy, boxy, and perhaps emotionally unyielding.

3. Historical & Thematic Terminology

Persecution: Hostility and ill-treatment, especially because of race or political beliefs. This is the driving force of the conflict within the Nazi regime.

Refuge: A place of safety. The basement serves as a physical refuge for Max, while literature serves as a mental refuge for Liesel.

Register: The text transitions between *formal* historical descriptions and *colloquial*, sharp dialogue (as seen in Rosa's "sharp-tongued" characterization).
